The Importance of Foot Supports and Mobility Aids Following Your Foot or Ankle Surgery

In preparing for your foot or ankle surgery, take some time to consider the appliances you'll require to assist your recovery and rehabilitation following your operation.

It is very likely you will be required to purchase a foot or ankle support to protect the work done during surgery. You may also require a mobility aid to assist you in getting around. This brochure outlines some of your options.

It is worthwhile planning a week in advance to ensure you have time to source the footwear and trial the aids required before your surgery.

Post-Operative Foot and Ankle Supports

A foot or ankle support provides stability to aid in the healing process following surgery. Examples include a post operative (post op) shoe and a Constrained Ankle Motion (CAM) boot.

A Post Op Shoe (see image 1) protects the foot from bending after forefoot surgery such as bunion correction.

A Controlled Ankle Motion (CAM) Boot (see image 2) – also known as a 'Moon Boot' – reduces the amount of pressure going through the foot and ankle after hindfoot and ankle surgery, such as ankle fusion or a ligament reconstruction.

Post-operative foot and ankle supports range in price from approximately \$100 to \$500 and will usually be fitted by trained staff. Your private health insurance provider may provide a rebate on surgical footwear, depending on your cover.

Please check with the surgeon's rooms as to which post-operative footwear is required after your surgery.

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Mobility Aids

Following your foot or ankle surgery, there are a few options of ways to ambulate. These include a walker (image 4), crutches or a wheelchair (image 5). Again, your private health insurance provider may provide a rebate on these devices, depending on your cover and individual circumstances. You also have the option to hire, rather than purchase your aid, if this is more suitable for you.


We suggest visiting your physiotherapist for assessment of which mobility aid will work best for you.

A new gait aid is the iWalk 2.0.

The iWalk 2.0 (see image 3) is a hands-free crutch system that allows you to ambulate hands-free whilst recovering from an ankle or foot injury. It gives you greater independence than other aids such as a knee scooter or elbow crutches as it does not require your hands to operate it.

This is suitable for people with good strength and coordination. It is only suitable if the injury is on one leg and the other leg is fully functioning.

It is worth trialling the i-Walk prior to your surgery to make sure that you have the balance and coordination required.
